By definition: discontinue, over throw, release, let rest, shake, stumble, throw down, let alone, desist from doing something. To let loose, let it fall. I.1 Chronicles 13:9 – the oxen stumbled, the oxen upset it or shook it (referring to the Ark). II. We are asked for the release of a debtor from his debts every 7 years and was to be a continuing reminder that those who had themselves experienced the favor of Yahowah in remission of sins ought to also offer the same in their interpersonal relationships. III. In Ex 23:11, Yahowah asks that the land be allowed to rest, lie fallow every 7 years. It became an opportunity to trust Yahowah with the understanding that His promises to bless far beyond any loss that would come about by letting the land rest or releasing the debtor's debt every 7 years.	9	Ex 21:11

				Ancient pictographs designate sounds like English letters, but each letter has a symbolic meaning. We have found that the direction the pictographs face and the pictographs they are juxtaposed to influence their meaning.		
	𐤇			Shin: Teeth, press, form words, language, nourishment (literal & symbolic), pressure (mental and physical).		
	𐤍			Mem: Water, life, cleansing or chaos and confusion, mighty sea, or the metaphor for gowym (Gentiles).		
	⊗			Theth: Basket, holds something or someone that is precious. A container or bowl. It is a mark, an illiterate person's signature. It is a registration mark on maps (X marks the spot!).		
	𐤌			Hey: Sign of being upright and engaged (walking the proper path, Mow'edym). It shows one beholding the greatness of Yahowah and in awe with respect. I think of it as a near or completed person in the sense of being upright and as one who understands.		
				NOTE: There is another S Samech and another T Taw. They are interchangeable with the Shin and Theth, respectively.		
	𐤎			Samech: The other 'S' – Samech represents something sharp and piercing (thorny). It can represent a shield, fence that protects or turns away. Also, as an upright pole, it could represent a support or signpost.		
	𐤏			Taw: The other 'T' – Taw represents a pole, beam mark, signature, and signpost along the way (think Tysown). A banner akin to a lighthouse. It is a definitive upright pole like unto 'Edown that supports the Ark of the Covenant and holds up the Family.		
				Hebrew grammar here tells us of how serious the intent is from Yahowah's point of view. Shamitah, as a feminine noun, is straightforward enough. However, in Deu 15:12 (in Hebrew, it is <i>Dabarym</i> – Words), Shamitah is written in the infinitive absolute and is an extremely flexible non-finite verbal form. This form is used most often to express intensity or certainty of verbal action. It tells us that this is extremely important and to ignore it (Shamitah) is not without harsh consequences.
